Rules on Handling of Intellectual Property Related to PJLink Specification Class1

1. Basic Approach

Japan Business Machine and Information System Industries Association (hereinafter referred to as "JBMIA") believes it desirable to adopt PJLink Specification Class1 (hereinafter referred to as "I/F Specification") created by its PJLink Working Group, the Data Projector Group, and adopted by JBMIA as a standard I/F specification and have it widely supported and adopted by the industry.

To accomplish this, those who wish to adopt such standard I/F specification should be able to use intellectual property, especially patent rights and utility model rights, that will be essential in commercializing products based on such standard I/F specification, under fair and reasonable conditions.

Based on this approach, JBMIA presents this document to obtain agreement of the member companies regarding the following matters related to patent rights and utility model rights of the standard I/F specification.

2. Agreed Matters

- 1) Essential patent rights and utility model rights are claim scopes of patents and utility models that are technically unavoidable to meet the standard I/F specification, including those which may later become rights.
- 2) Upon signing of This Agreement, the licensees of the standard I/F specification are deemed to have agreed to license all essential patent rights and utility model rights possessed by them indiscriminately under reasonable conditions.
- 3) Licensing to the I/F specification licensee shall be processed between owners of essential patent rights and utility model rights and I/F specification licensees.
- 4) The PJLink Working Group will not be responsible entirely for problems arising from patent rights and utility model rights related to such standard I/F specification.
- 5) Handling of copyrights, trademarks and logos, and other intellectual property related to the standard I/F specification shall be decided separately as necessary.
- 6) In the event licensees of the standard I/F specification discontinue licensing for reasons whatsoever, licensing of all essential patent rights and utility model rights that are already licensed shall be continued under the same conditions and all essential patent rights and utility model rights possessed after discontinuation of licenses shall be licensed indiscriminately under reasonable conditions.
